#### **Program - Bringing a Podcast to Life**

In April, our first full month of Spring, we are hosting a woman of great talent who understands the strength and purpose of community. Our speaker is Brenda González whose podcast, Tamarindo (<a href="https://www.tamarindopodcast.com">https://www.tamarindopodcast.com</a>), brings to light issues of special importance to the Latine community. She will be explaining how she came to work on this podcast and other aspects of her career that contributed to the development of Tamarindo. Following is a brief introduction to our speaker.



Brenda Gonzalez is a public speaker, fitness instructor, and nonprofit consultant, focusing on social justice causes. She founded Tamarindo Podcast in 2016 with the mission to use comedy and laughter to illuminate important issues impacting the Latine community.

Brenda's experience as a formerly undocumented student shaped her interest in politics and she taught American Government at Cal State Fullerton before she was even eligible to vote.

Before consulting, Brenda was Regional Director at UnidosUS, the nation's largest Latino civil rights organization. She also worked in corporate social responsibility for a fortune 100 company.

González's unique experience of combining laughter with serious topics will surely make this both an enlightening and enjoyable presentation, so I hope to see as many of you at our April 13<sup>th</sup> Branch meeting as possible, see Hospitality page for details.

*National AAUW elections* — Voting starts April 3 for a proposed amendment to the AAUW Bylaws to open membership to any individual who supports AAUW's important mission of advancing equity for women and girls. All members without an email address on file will receive a paper ballot by mail. No additional paper ballots will be sent during the voting period. Voting will close on Wednesday, May 15 at 12:00 pm ET.

A reminder that it's time again to renew your membership for the majority of us. Most of our memberships expire June 30, 2024. New members have expiration dates one year from when they joined. If anyone wants to know when their membership expires, please let me know.

There are two ways to pay your dues.

If you want to pay on-line, you can do that now. For most of us, after you log in, click on "RENEW", make sure your information is correct, then choose "National" membership.

Remember to say yes to the question, "Would you like to add Branch or State memberships?" If you don't, you will only be a member of National, not a member of our branch. The branch names are in the order by the branch number. States are alphabetical, but in California look for our branch under CA0124. Once you choose that, scroll all the way down to continue. You will notice that the State of California is already chosen for you. Your total should be \$116.00. For Lifetime members (those who have pre-paid National dues), choose "Lifetime." your dues should be \$44.00. ANY questions, please let me know.



# MYRA LONG SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Myra Long Scholarship Fund (MLSF) Committee Report

The MLSF is busy this month. Eight 13-year-old girls from the 7<sup>th</sup> grade at Rivera Middle School in Pico Rivera were interviewed on March 18<sup>th</sup>. Five young women were selected to attend the Tech Trek Camp at Whittier College in June. The total cost will be \$6,000.

Two of the girls are designated as back up campers in case the original selected girls are not available. The review committee included: Brenda Carrillo, Ann Chambers, Kay Clark, Nadine Wilcox, Karen van der Baan and Barbara Gile.

Tech Trek is a weeklong science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) summer camp designed to develop interest, excitement, and self-confidence in young women who are entering the eighth grade. The camp is hosted by AAUW California and is a program of the American Association of University Women (AAUW). Tech Trek offers two types of camps. One is residential in which students get a taste of college life by living in a dorm on a college campus; one is an online virtual camp for students who prefer to stay at home. Both types of camps are dynamic and offer plenty of fun, challenging activities, interactions with women who are in STEM fields, group projects, field trips, and a chance to meet other girls with similar interests. The camps are run by teachers, volunteers, and former campers who loved it enough to come back as counselors.

Carole Restovich, Scholarship Chairperson has worked with Rio Hondo Community College to have our scholarships advertised campus wide. Plus, she has met several teachers that will promote the availability of the MLSF. We will expand the High School scholarships to three schools. Interviews will be held on Saturday, May 4, 2024. Ms. Jennifer Sedillo, our liaison at Pioneer High, says that two senior girls have already turned in their applications.

The committee will offer \$5,000 in Special Projects Grants to teachers. This has been a popular way to assist individual teachers to meet their goals.

El Cholo Mexican Restaurant






Travel notes from **Mandy Knight**; "I just recently returned from a fun, informative and first-time trip to New Orleans ....during the Mardi Gras season!! The visit included a fabulous evening at the New Orleans School of Cooking where a former middle school teacher entertained us for two hours while she prepared a 3 course (think butter) meal of local fare (Corn and Crab Bisque, Chicken Etouffee, and Bananas Foster) while sharing her Creole culture and the rich and treasured history of the region. Cemeteries and their "above ground 2-bedroom condos", the mansions and universities on St. Charles Ave, a visit to Mardi Gras World where floats are imagined, designed, and built, the French Quarter and Bourbon Street, the sounds of jazz wafting through the streets, and the revealing residue of beignets were just the warm up for the 2 parades that we enjoyed one evening. Beads and coins (and granola bars) were tossed and scooped up as the Druid Krewe parade floats streamed by our group, fully clothed, warm and comfy on a grandstand just around the corner from our hotel. The National World War II Museum is in New Orleans, and a wonderful way to take in moving personal stories, historical artifacts, and interactive displays illuminating the American experience during the WWII era. From the Normandy invasion to the sands of the Pacific Islands, the Museum salutes the optimism, courage and sacrifice of those who won the war and changed the world.
