Program

For our last Program of the 2024-2025 year, we will shine the light on our Scholarship recipients. We have invited them and their families to join us at our branch meeting and share their stories. The scholarship program is one of the mainstays of our mission, and we always enjoy meeting the recipients in person. We will also have the installation of branch officers for the 2025-2026 year.

In our branch meeting on May 10th, we asked our members what they remembered as significant among the various programs we had this year. Each of the programs was mentioned, from the Tech Trek girls in September, to the artist, Lisa Ruiz, who spoke at the Whittier Art Gallery about Ida O'Keeffe in April. Few had heard of Ida O'Keeffe, and they were glad to know about her. They also appreciated a change in venue and felt invigorated by being in a new space.

Other members commented on the importance of Margo Reeg's October presentation of the ballot measures, and some members took note that Dr. Ninochka McTaggart had set the right tone for the year in speaking about equity. In December, we heard from Diane Britton from the Women and Children's Crisis Shelter and presented her with gift cards donated by individual members.

A majority of our members expressed appreciation for Pat Dudley's DEI segments, which really encouraged us to talk with each other. Several members mentioned the need for personal stories to better understand how discrimination is sometimes subtle. The need for "listening" to one another came up a couple of times, too, and the desire to have more conversations with our fellow members was also requested. It is something we can strive for.

Mary Ann Pacheco had made an impact as well. At least two members believe she should be asked to come back. She not only clarified the need for financial literacy, but she also gave us a snapshot of some of the various areas of Whittier that need attention.

Emily Teipe, though, was the speaker mentioned most often. Her presentation of the 1911 Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire had left an imprint on many of us. She reminded us that repression of women was not all that long ago, and we still have obstacles to overcome today, but luckily, working in unsafe buildings is not one of them.

Your comments are invaluable, and as Program Director, I will use them as a guide in the upcoming year, so I thank you for them. For now, though, let's move on to June, where we will welcome our new officers and celebrate our new scholarship awardees. I hope you will all be able to attend this delightful Branch meeting!

At Rio Hondo, she has been active in Next Up, the Pathways to Law Program, and Rise Scholars. Her long-term goal is to pursue a career in law and eventually become a judge. She wants "to be a voice for youth and people who feel that they don't have a voice."

Lorena Juarez will be attending Nebraska Methodist College. An incident during COVID when she worked as a nurse's aide convinced her that she wanted to become a registered nurse. She has been through numerous challenges including being a DACA student (she now has a Green Card), being abandoned by her father and working as a child in the fields in Sacramento during summers. "My academic journey proves my perseverance."

Diversity, Equity & Inclusion (DEI)

At the May branch meeting members had an opportunity to participate in table discussions and writing activities providing ideas for the 2025-2026 Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion activities. Books were displayed for review for our GWA READS DEI sessions. They will be available at the June meeting as well. This year, the state board read the book *The Four Pivots* by Shawn A. Ginwright, PhD. The focus of the April 26 AAUW California Annual Event was on content from the book. All members are being encouraged to read this book in the coming year. You will hear more about this in September.

The GWA READS DEI selection will be <u>Me and White Supremacy</u> by Layla F. Saad. It is a guided journaling experience that can be found as a pdf workbook that parallels the book. Our GWA Reads sessions will provide an opportunity to discuss the concepts presented in each section, followed by group and/or independent writing.

Something new for 2025-2026: There are many excellent fiction books that have one or more diversity, equity, and inclusion themes embedded in the story. Some recent examples read by our book sections include: <u>James</u> by Percival Everett, <u>The Women</u> by Kristin Hannah, and <u>The Heaven and Earth Grocery Store</u> by James McBride. Next year, one of our DEI branch meeting activities will be a panel and table discussions of DEI books centered around a DEI theme.

Everyone can be involved in this event. We are a branch of avid readers. One way to prepare for this branch activity is for the book sections to select at least one book with a DEI theme and present a summary of the book on the panel. Most book summaries online will list themes of a book to guide you in selecting an appropriate title. Book groups that have read the titles in this article could include those books for the panel presentation. All members can contribute to the table discussions from their personal reading. As you read, answer the questions: What role did (DEI theme) play in the narration? How did it impact the story, the characters? More information will be in the September newsletter, but <u>start now as you select your summer reading choices</u>.

Two books displayed at the meeting that might interest our book sections or as an individual reading selection: <u>The God of the Woods</u> by Liz Moore and <u>The Faith Club: A Muslim, A</u> <u>Christian, A Jew-- Three Women Search for Understanding</u> by Ranya Idliby, Suzanne Oliver, and Priscilla Warner. <u>The God of the Woods</u> provides insight into the haves and have-nots (privilege) in a town when a camper goes missing. <u>The Faith Club</u> is a true narration of three women: a Muslim, a Christian, and a Jew; searching for understanding, and provides a path for interfaith conversations. If you know of a book with a DEI theme, send titles to me to include in newsletters to give members choices of books to read.

- Shavuot celebrates harvest of the first fruits and commemorates the giving of the Torah and Commandments at Mount Sinai.
- Day of Arafah is the ninth day of the Islamic lunar month. This is one of the most important days in the Islamic calendar. It is the day that Allah perfected His religion, completed His favors upon His beloved Prophet Muhammad, and approved Islam as a way of life.
- Eid al-Adha is an important festival in the Islamic calendar. The festival remembers the prophet Ibrahim's willingness to sacrifice his son when God ordered him to.
- Juneteenth combines the words June and nineteenth. It is a day commemorating June 19, 1865, when Union General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas, to announce that the enslaved people there were freed by executive decree. This day is also known as Freedom Day or Emancipation Day.
- Islamic New Year is determined by the lunar calendar. It does not always occur on the same date of the Gregorian calendar, but will vary each year.

PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW Public Policy Principles 2025-2027 Adopted May 2025

AAUW's Public Policy Principles

AAUW's mission to advance gender equity through research, education, and advocacy is grounded in these bold principles:

AAUW opposes all forms of discrimination on the basis of age, disability, race, ethnicity, sex, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, geographical location, national origin, religious beliefs, pregnancy or parental status, or socioeconomic status, and supports constitutional protection for the civil rights of all individuals.

We Stand for Education

Higher Education:

Support affordable, inclusive higher education that yields high-quality credentials or degrees; reduce barriers to completion; and address the student debt burden, especially for women and borrowers of color.

• Public Education:

Invest in strong public K–12 systems and oppose the use of public funds for nonpublic schools.

• Inclusive Curriculum:

Ensure curricula are accurate, science-based, and free from censorship or bias.

• STEM Opportunities:

Close the gender gap in STEM and expand access to vocational and technical training.

• Strengthened Civil Rights Protections:

Support safe, harassment-free learning environments by strengthening and enforcing protections to prohibit discrimination based on sex, race, and disability.

We Stand for Economic Security

• Pay Equity:

Ensure equal pay for work of equal value through salary transparency, fair wage laws, and anti-discrimination enforcement.

• Support for Caregivers:

Expand access to paid sick and family leave, and affordable child and elder care.

• Retirement Security:

Protect and strengthen Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid.

• Reproductive Freedom:

Ensure access to contraception and abortion care.

We Stand for Social Justice and Civil Rights

• Constitutional Rights:

Vigorously enforce civil rights, including recognition and publication of the Equal Rights Amendment, and improve disaggregated data collection.

• Expanding Voting Rights:

Promote equitable political participation and ensure all Americans have full access and the right to vote.

• Freedom from Harassment and Violence:

Guarantee legal protections from harassment and gender-based violence, and support efforts to combat human trafficking and reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act.

• International & Civil Rights:

Support U.S. advancement toward gender equity in education and the economy through the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action and ratification of CEDAW.


