Profile of an Unknown, Yet Very Important Woman

Did you see that? Did October just fly by on a witch's broom or was I so entangled in a ghost's nightmare for the past few weeks that I totally missed it? Whatever the case, November is here, and the Program is set. We will be welcoming guest speaker, Celeste Candida, who will speak about Henrietta Lacks and her little-known, but important, story.

Celeste Candida is a retired professor who has a voracious appetite for taking in life experiences that continually feed her appetite for learning. She grew up in Detroit, Michigan, earned her bachelor's degree in journalism at Wayne State University, and later earned her master's degree in English at Loyola Marymount University.

She began her career as a journalist in Detroit. Her travels took her to Honolulu, Hawaii, where she worked as an assistant editor for a tourist newspaper, and finally to Los Angeles, where she was a copy editor for the Los Angeles Herald Examiner, before moving on to teaching. She has taught composition courses at Citrus College, Pasadena City College, Whittier College, and Rio Hondo College, where she encouraged students to write essays on less common topics. Why? Because she looks to history to bring out the stories of people who are often overlooked, like Henrietta Lacks, whom she will tell us about at our upcoming Branch meeting.

Now that Celeste is retired, she has gone back to writing, but this time, she's writing fiction, and has already published a romance novel titled *Second Chance for Love*. She is presently working in a new genre, the detective novel.

When Celeste is not creating vivid characters for her novels, we might find her taking photographs of interesting objects, keeping up with Linkin Park concerts, baking, or volunteering at Union Station Homeless Services in Pasadena. What she likes best, however, is spending time with her thirty-something daughter, Maria.

Celeste's curiosity in people, in history, and in her research keeps her intellectually active, and an ideal teacher! I hope you will be able to join us for Celeste's presentation of Henrietta Lacks on November 8th at our Branch meeting. We would love to see you there to learn more about this African American woman, Henrietta Lacks, who changed medical history.

Time Capsule/100

- The Whittier Branch of the AAUW began in the summer of 1925 when Mrs. Walter Dexter, wife of the Whittier College president, encouraged Dr. Mary Hill, a college faculty member, to visit the AAUW National Headquarters.
- On September 10, 1925, seventeen women representing different colleges gathered at Mrs. Dexter's home to organize the new branch.
- These women lived in a time of great change - when closed cars were replacing open models and General Electric had just introduced a new automatic, quiet refrigerator that only needed defrosting once or twice a month.
- In 1927, when the Model T changed to the Model A, a farmer's wife was asked why her family had a car but no bathtub. She replied, "You can't drive to town in a bathtub."

We give thanks to Mrs. Dexter for recognizing, a century ago, that Whittier needed AAUW. No matter how the Thanksgiving menu evolves or who carves the turkey, the spirit of gratitude and unity continues to thrive.

PUBLIC POLICY

Measure G - Los Angeles County Government Reform Act

Los Angeles County Government Reform as adopted by voters in November 2024 as Measure G is now in the implementation phase under the direction of the Government Reform Task Force. The Task Force is composed of 13 members appointed by the Supervisors, unions, and 5 selected from applicants by the appointed members.

Now that the Task Force members have chosen a Chair, Martin Rodarte and Vice-Chair, Nancy Yap, adopted bylaws, and set up several ad hoc committees to study and make recommendations on the most timely projects, they are making some progress on their major tasks. A key issue is pushing the Board of Supervisors to determine an appropriate solution to the dilemma that Measure J, passed by the voters in November 2020, which amends the County charter to require at least 10% of locally generated, unrestricted revenue be reinvested into community development and alternatives to incarceration, was never actually entered into the Charter. Measure G provisions cancel this ordinance in 2028.

Task Force meetings are held on Wednesdays at 5 pm at county locations including Magic Johnson Recreation Center in South LA. These meetings are streamed live on a secure system called WebEx. The schedule and agendas, as well as recordings of past meetings, can be found at <https://measureg.lacounty.gov/task-force-meetings>. Community members can sign up to have email notices sent to them. On the website can be found bios of the 13 Task Force members and the text of Measure G. The next meeting is set for November 12.



Major tasks for the Task force include these items:

1. By 2026 Establish an independent Ethics Commission and Office of Ethics Compliance with a Compliance Officer
2. By 2028 Establish a Director of Budget and Management and mandate public budget presentations during Supervisor meetings
3. Create a position of Legislative Analyst to advise the supervisors on impact of legislation
4. By 2028 set out criteria for electing a County Executive accountable for the County's \$45 billion budget.
5. Create a process to Expand the Board of Supervisors from 5 to 9 elected members starting in 2032. Boundaries of the 9 districts will be determined by the Independent Citizen's Redistricting commission using data from the 2030 census.
6. Establish a Charter Review Commission to meet every 10 years to review governance and the County Charter.

More information on the Government Reform Task Force and its responsibilities will be the subject of the LACIC November 9 meeting.

Carole Restovich reported that all the College Scholarships were processed except for one (Earlyne Clemons scholarship). The reason was the applicant had already graduated, and there was no school documentation of enrollment in the college for the next semester

Kaye Kidwell discussed the girls selected for Tech Trek from Los Nietos 7th grade. Communication was delayed due to moving the 6th grade class the district from grammar school to the Middle School. We are waiting to give the \$6,000 from the 2024-2025 budget for a STEM program at Los Nietos Grammar School.

Paula Ocampo, President, stated she is continuing to find a Tech Trek Coordinator for this year. She will attend all the Zoom meetings to assist the new person.

Carole Restovich reported that she had received feedback from the recipients of the College Scholarships for the nursing students.

Susan Halliday reported all the High School Scholarships were delivered and all the girls were enrolled in their respective colleges. Next year La Serna and Santa Fe High Schools are where we will draw applicants for the 2025-2026 Scholarships.

Sharon Heck reported the 2026 Math/Science Conference will be held at Whittier College on January 7, 2026. Fourteen schools have responded.

The most exciting news we have is that we increased the 2025-2026 budget by \$25,000, in order to give \$100,000 in scholarships in honor of the branch's 100th Anniversary.

Enter disgraced police detective Daniel Hawthorne, a brilliant, eccentric man as quick with an insult as he is to crack a case. And Hawthorne has a partner, the celebrated novelist Anthony Horowitz, curious about the case and looking for new material. As brusque, impatient, and annoying as Hawthorne can be, Horowitz—a seasoned hand when it comes to crime stories—suspects the detective may be on to something, and is irresistibly drawn into the mystery.

But as the case unfolds, Horowitz realizes that he’s at the center of a story he can’t control, and his brilliant partner may be hiding dark and mysterious secrets of his own.”

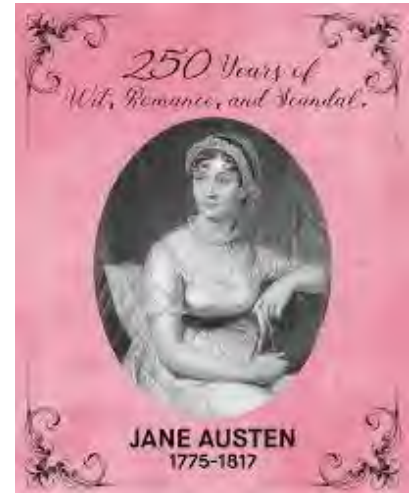

Please join us in reading and discussing *Persuasion*, by Jane Austen, at 10AM on Monday, November 24. This December will be Jane Austen's 250th birthday! *Persuasion*, Austen's final completed novel (1817), features her trademark humor, style, and memorable characters. At twenty-seven, Anne Elliot not only is no longer young and has few romantic prospects, but her family is dealing with financial losses. Eight years earlier, she had been persuaded by her friend Lady Russell to break off her engagement to Frederick Wentworth, a handsome naval captain with neither fortune nor rank. Now Wentworth has returned, having made his fortune as a naval officer in the Napoleonic wars. How will Anne overcome family and societal expectations and her own feelings that she has irrevocably missed her chance? Can Captain Wentworth forgive her for rejecting him in the past? *Persuasion* is a brilliant satire of vanity and pretension, a picture of a time of societal change, but also a love story tinged with the heartache of missed opportunities.
