PUBLIC POLICY

School Boards - The Overlooked Frontline of Democracy

Last month, Seena Trigas from the Public Policy School Board Project team, submitted an excellent article reminding members of the crucial role that public education plays in our democracy. The current – and seemingly never-ending - assaults on that institution gave rise to the School Board Project, which is now entering its third year.

When we started this project, our main focus initially was to encourage members to actively participate in identifying, recruiting and supporting candidates to run for school boards whose education values were in line with ours at AAUW California. For a number of reasons, our focus shifted to an emphasis on encouraging and training members to attend school board meetings and let us know what they are seeing in their districts. We had a remarkable response, and we want to thank all our members who have answered that call.

As we enter our 3rd iteration of the project, we want to continue that momentum, but narrow the scope to watching for and speaking out against violations of California's protective laws; add a new component of learning how to make a greater impact by working in coalition with other public education supportive organizations; and swing back to where we started with re-engaging and increasing our efforts to ensure district board majorities that support **all** students and the free flow of ideas. In this last regard, we have recently discovered an organization called the School Board Integrity Project, and I can't say it better than their Executive Director, Kyrstin Schuette, as stated in an Op-Ed she wrote on September 3, 2025 in *The Courier*:

"The redistricting battle is important and we shouldn't minimize it, but it's equally important that we pursue local pathways to power to protect our families and our neighbors from the extremism sweeping our country. The solution lies in recruiting, training, and electing school board members who will practice good governance, pursue academic freedom and excellence, and foster schools where every student belongs."



COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

Ballot Processing Center Tour

An eager group of League of Women Voters and AAUW voters joined **Margo Reeg** for a tour of the Ballot Processing Center (BPC) in Industry on November 5. Our tour guides were Michael Iterralde,

Kathay Feng, and briefly Jeff Klein, Director of the BPC.

Highlights of the tour were seeing the drug-sniffing dogs examining the trays of ballots brought in from the Post Office and from the Ballot Drop Boxes. This is to protect the employees who are handling thousands of ballots. The high-tech signature verification machine operates at an amazing speed—about 6 envelopes per second. Any envelope lacking a signature or one where the signature does not match is kicked out for hand examination. Signatures are compared against the DMV signature and all Voting signatures from previous elections. This machine also slits the envelopes. Teams of trained workers did the hand comparison of signatures looking for specific details to verify match.



Banks of workers examine ballots which have passed the signature check. They check the ballot for tears, marks, spills, and extraneous extra items in the envelope. Ballots that have stains or tears are sent to a separate area to be remade by a pair of workers. The ruined ballot and remade ballot are kept together.



At about 3:15 PM a batch of ballots that had been scanned and counted was safeguarded inside a glass walled, locked room. The new vote ballot tally of 93,000 additional ballots was posted while we were watching. After being counted the ballots are boxed and stored for 18 to 22 months in case a recount is requested. While we were on our tour representatives from the federal Department of Justice arrived to examine the processes of ballot counting. This is somewhat unusual for a state election with no federal items on the ballot.

The part of the 1% manual count had been done in the morning. Ballots from 1% of the precincts are examined by hand by teams of 3 people as an added accuracy check on the electronic count. About 25,000 ballots had to be hand checked.
